At the beginning, on that Whit Monday of 1828, Kaspar Hauser's appearance out of the blue created as great a sensation as did later his death by murder.

A prolific literature has grown around him attempting to prove either that Kaspar Hauser was a criminal making false claims, or that he was not only someone against whom crimes had been committed but actually came from a princely house of Central Europe.

Rudolf Steiner spoke of the world mission of Central Europe as essential for the development of both East Rudolf Steiner pointed out that if two and West. remarkable personalities, von Bismarck (1815-1898) and von Lassalle (1825-1864), could have worked together with the only throne in Central Europe, which might have given them the setting they needed, an entirely different course of history would have happened.

That throne to which their powers might have been directed was that which should have been occupied by Kaspar Hauser – the House of Baden.
