Why is Kaspar Hauser's story so compelling? Why does he continually prod at our conscience?

Here in America it appears that we have lost the middle; we cannot so easily count on a basic common ground of human understanding from one to another. What has happened to the humanist founding ideals of this country?

Kaspar Hauser's childhood was cut short very early in his life by imprisonment in a darkened cell. When he was released about twelve years later his childlike soul had become amplified. It radiated perfect trust and innocence. In a very short time he became a touchstone for the best of humanity, a living example of purity, sensitivity and gentleness. As such he became a wonder and was named the Child of Europe.

So many themes come up: How are we educating our young? What is the result of over institutionalization? What is a healthy government? What has happened to the social ideals of liberty, equality and brotherhood, the rallying cries of the French Revolution, which had its roots in the founding of America? Kaspar Hauser's mission was to have been to carry forward this humanism in the southern German state of Baden-Wurtenburg, balancing the militaristic tendencies of Prussia in the north and opening the way to a peaceful Europe that would have upheld the humanity of all.

Europe and America are bound to one another like twins, both dark and light. We hope to offer a soul/spiritual counter balance to these troubling times with a Michaelmas festival of insight and exploration of these themes.
